



## **Steve Mark Arrollado**


## **Plan of Action**

- •FAE Linton worked with Arrollado for 20 minutes.
- Burned area was still hot and smokey.
- Plan of action:

wet unburned fuel
prevent fire from running uphill
and crossing the road

- 1½" hose line with 3/8" tip
- 125 psi, used by Linton and Arrollado

From the can of	the engine, Linton	saw the fire make	a run towards
Arrollado. Arrollado sprayed water, then backed across the road, shutting the nozzle and laying down.			

## **Change in Fire Behavior**

- · Fire swept over the road to the South
- Linton ordered Arrollado to turn water on (over the P.A.)
- Arrollado got up on one knee, sprayed water facing the fire
- Flames now 5' to 6' high
- Linton ordered Arrollado to "get out of there, come to the truck!"









































#### **Emergency Treatment**

- Arrollado was transported by helicopter to the hospital in
   40 minutes from the time of the accident
- He had 3<sup>rd</sup> degree burns over 40% of his body and 2<sup>nd</sup> degree burns over 20% of his body
- He died August 28, 1973, 17 days after the accident.
